The global challenge of dementia is not expected to wind down any time soon. By 2050, the number of individuals having to live with dementia will double in all G7 countries, and will more than quadruple in low-/middle-income countries.

This global challenge requires a strong global response. A major source of success of this enterprise will reside in our capacity to increase the collaboration between researchers, disciplines, countries and especially between Academia and Industry.

Indeed, academia/Industry synergies and effective collaboration will be crucial for a better understanding of the underlying mechanisms of the many different neurodegenerative diseases, and their many different variants, as well as to transform this knowledge into solutions to stop, delay or better care for people with dementia and their caregivers.

For each panel the process will be the same. Following the presentations by the panelists, you will be invited to discuss, comment or ask a question. The discussion will be initiated by targeted discussants who have kindly accepted to ignite the discussion. These people are identified in the program as discussant for each panel.

We will take note of all of the ideas towards solutions that will be proposed by panelists, discussants and all of you. We will provide a synthesis of these proposals to the World Dementia Council and the Envoy shortly after the event, in order to contribute and support the work of the Council towards a global action plan against dementia.

We would like to express our appreciation to all of the panelists, experts, and all participants for your involvement in this important event. Personally, I would like to thank our colleagues from Canada for hosting this event and for their hard work in organizing what represents a positive turning point in Academia Industry relationships to combat dementia. Together, we will identify the path for enhanced interaction and collaboration between Academia and Industry to the benefit of all people living with dementia and their caregivers.

The organization of the Canada-France event was itself based on the close collaboration between two countries with a long history of scientific collaboration in the area of dementia.
